Presenters:

Silvia Álvarez-Olarra es profesora asociada de la Universidad de la Ciudad de Nueva York (CUNY-BMCC). Sus publicaciones más recientes dentro de los estudios mexicanos se han desarrollado en el campo del cine y las estéticas visuales en general. En estos momentos está trabajando en la coedición de un volumen colectivo sobre el cine de Carlos Reygadas de pronta publicación en Edinburgh University Press.

George Azcárate is an assistant professor of Hispanic Studies at Vassar College in Poughkeepsie, NY. He earned his R.N. from St. Margaret School of Nursing (2009), a B.S.N. from Chatham University (2010), an M.A. in Iberian and Latin American Studies from the University of Notre Dame (2019), and a Ph.D. in Spanish from the University of Notre Dame (2025). His research and teaching interests explore the healer/patient relationship and how the patient's body is transformed into a book that the healer not only reads in search of signs and symptoms, but also writes and edits.

Diana Barnes teaches Spanish language and literature along with US/Mexico border studies at Skidmore College. Her border courses examine artistic representations of the essence of division and consider US immigration policy and its consequences from a humanitarian perspective.

Ilka Kressner is an Associate Professor of Hispanic Studies at UAlbany, SUNY. Her scholarship and teaching examine contemporary Latin American film, literature, and visual arts within a Pan-Latin American perspective, often with a comparative focus. Her research areas are the environmental humanities, ecofeminisms, conceptions of space in art and of art in space, and intermediality.

Esteban Loustaunau is Professor of Spanish and Director of the Community Service-Learning Program at Assumption University in Worcester, MA. He earned a Ph.D. and M.A. in Latin American literatures and cultures at The Ohio State University, and a B.A. in Spanish at Carleton College. His research interests focus on contemporary Mexican and Central American literature, film, and music as these intersect with issues related to migration caused by dispossession and expulsion. He has led engaged learning and artistic projects to empower Mexican immigrants in the Midwest and, most recently, Central American unaccompanied refugee minors in New England. His scholarly work has been published in several book collections and in peer reviewed journals such as Revista Iberoamericana, CR: The New Centennial Review, Revista de Literatura

Mexicana Contemporánea, Latino Studies, Diálogo: An Interdisciplinary Studies Journal, among others. With Lauren Shaw, he is co-editor of the book *Telling Migrant Stories: Latin American Diaspora in Documentary Film* (University of Florida Press, 2018; 2021).

Guadalupe Nettel is the author of the international award-winning novels *El huésped* (2006), *El cuerpo en que nací* (2011), *Después del invierno* (2014), and *La hija única* (2020), as well as the collections of short stories *El matrimonio de los peces rojos* (2013) and *Los divagantes* (2023), among others. Her work has been translated into more than twenty languages and has appeared in publications such as *Granta*, *The White Review*, *El País*, and *The New York Times*. She has been the director of the *Revista de la Universidad de México*. Her books have been adapted as theater pieces, performances, and films. *La hija única*, published in English as *Still born*, was shortlisted for the 2023 International Booker Prize. She was a 2024–2025 fellow of the Institute for Ideas and Imagination.

Claudio Palomares-Salas is Associate Professor of Latin American Studies at Queen's University. He is the author of *Mexican Canto Nuevo: Music, Politics, and Resistance* (Oxford University Press, 2025); *The Spatiality of the Hispanic Avant-Garde* (Brill, 2020), the novel *El lugar más triste para soñar* (Lugar Común, 2014), and of numerous academic articles. His areas of specialization are 20th and 21st centuries Spanish and Latin American literature, Latin American music, the Nueva Canción movements in Mexico and Latin America (1960–1980s), the transatlantic Hispanic avantgarde movements (1910–1920s), and the Latin American diasporas in the U.S. and Canada. In addition to his academic work, he is an active drummer in Montreal who has toured and recorded with various artists in Mexico, Canada, and abroad.

Kristi Peterson is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Art History at Skidmore College, where she teaches courses on the visual cultures of the Americas. Her primary research focuses on Aztec sacred images and their use in crafting cultural identity narratives for the empire, image theory in Mesoamerican philosophy, and ritual performance. She also researches Colonial and European representations of New World sacra and ritual; theories of representation, materialities, and the visualizations of colonial empires in the American hemisphere.


Jorge Quintana Navarrete is Associate Professor of Spanish at Dartmouth College. His research interests include Mexican culture (19th and 20th centuries), Utopian Studies, Environmental Humanities, and Science and Technology Studies. His book, *Biocosmism. Vitality and the Utopian Imagination in Postrevolutionary Mexico* (Vanderbilt University Press, 2024), examines the intellectual constellation of biocosmism or biocosmic thought: the study of universal life understood as the vital vibrancy that animates everything in the cosmos. He was awarded a Mellon New Directions Fellowship (2025–2028) for his research project *Geological Mexico: Science, Indigeneity, and the Framing of the Earth.*

Carmen A. Serrano es profesora asociada de literatura y cultura latinoamericana y Latinx en la Universidad at Albany, State University New York. Es autora de *Gothic Imagination in Latin*

American Fiction and Film (University of New Mexico Press 2019), "Vampiras eternas: espejismos modernistas y góticos en Isabel de Carmen Boullosa y La sed de Adriana Díaz Enciso" (Hispanic Issues, 2025), "Duplicitous Vampires Annihilating Tradition in Froylán Turcios's *El vampiro*" (Routledge, 2018) y "Revamping Dracula on the Mexican Silver Screen in Fernando Méndez's El vampiro" (University Press of Mississippi 2016). También es productora ejecutiva de la serie de podcasts, *UAlbany Student Stories*.

Emily Celeste Vázquez Enríquez is an assistant professor in the Department of Spanish and Portuguese at the University of California, Davis. Her book, Border Biomes: Ecological Imaginaries of Mexico's Edges (Vanderbilt University Press, 2025), puts into dialogue the fields of border and migration studies with the environmental humanities. Her research has appeared in Revista de la Universidad de México, Symposium, iMex, Romance Quarterly, Latin American Literary Review, and Ciberletras, among others.

Juan Pablo Villalobos's books include his Guardian First Book Award-shortlisted debut Fiesta en la madriguera [Down the Rabbit Hole] (2010), Te vendo un perro (2015), the Herralde award-winning novel No voy a pedirle a nadie que me crea (2016), Peluquería y letras (2022), and El pasado anda atrás de nosotros (2024), among others. He was born in Guadalajara, Mexico, and studied marketing and Spanish literature, before working as a market researcher and writing travel stories and literary and film criticism. The films Down the Rabbit Hole and I Don't Expect Anyone to Believe Me, based on two of her works, are available on Netflix.






